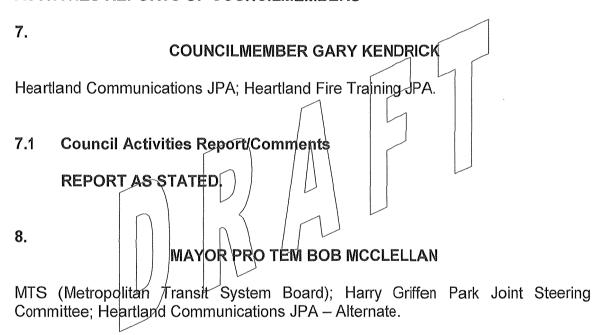

Tony Raheem, representing Crystal Ballroom, a neighboring business to the proposed business, stated that the additional traffic in the area would be a burden.

Nataly Kourabi, owner of Magnolia Adult Health Care Center, spoke against the proposed daycare center.

Councilmembers discussed the type of care given at **Ms. Kourabi's** establishment.

Lynn McDougal, stated for the record, that he holds no interest in the law firm, which bears his name, and **City Attorney Foley** represents. **Mr. McDougal** stated that **Ms. Kourabi** was supportive of the new day care center at the beginning, and he stated her concerns for opposing the new business are unfounded.

Councilmember Goble requested that Ms. Kourabi be given an additional three (3) minutes to be the last speaker of the evening, since Mr. McDougal was given that courtesy at the previous meeting.

Mayor Wells stated that he is concerned about the safety of the clients, and that he would like to stipulate a condition that a letter is provided by Mr. Terzibachian that a license has been obtained for the daycare center. If no licensing is required, a letter from Community Care Licensing, or any regulatory agency, stating the same.

SUBJECT: Approve Contract Change Order for Street Light Maintenance & Emergency

Repair Services Contract, Bid No. 022-13

RECOMMENDATION: That the City Council approves a 2.0% Consumer Price Index (CPI) Contract Change Order for Street Light Maintenance and Emergency Repair Services, Contract Bid No. 022-13, by \$1,831.52 for Fiscal Year 2017-18 for street light maintenance and emergency repair services. The existing contract amount with CTE, Inc., is \$91,576.13, and the revised amount requested is \$93,407.65.

BACKGROUND: The existing Street Light Maintenance Contract stipulates that the contractor may annually request a Consumer Price Index (CPI) adjustment to account for increases in materials and labor in the San Diego County region. A 2.0% CPI increase was requested by CTE, Inc., and was jointly approved by the cities of El Cajon, La Mesa, Lemon Grove, and Santee who are participating agencies of this contract. There have been a total of five contract amendments since July 16, 2013, totaling \$53,390.93 over the original contract amount of \$38,185.20. These five contract amendments have included three prior CPI increases and an additional lump sum of \$40,000.00 to cover unanticipated emergency work. Historically, the City has established contracts for both Street Light Maintenance and Traffic Signal Maintenance and Emergency Repairs based on a fixed amount of known quantities for routine and non-routine maintenance. Extraordinary work, such as street light pole knockdowns due to vehicle collisions, equipment failures, etc., is typically estimated to be \$15,000.00 per year. The proposed CPI adjustment to the Street Light Maintenance Contract has exceeded 25% of the original contract amount of \$38,185.20, originally executed on July 16, 2013. Council Policy B-4, "Contract Change Orders" requires approval by City Council if the proposed contract price change exceeds the 25% threshold.

FISCAL IMPACT: Increase the Street Light Maintenance & Emergency Repair Services Contract, Bid No. 022-13, by \$1,831.52 for Fiscal Year 2017-18. Sufficient funds are available in the current Fiscal Year 2017-18 Traffic Engineering Budget Activity 152310-8576 for this proposed Contract Change Order.

SUBJECT: Fletcher Parkway Slope Failure

RECOMMENDATION: That the City Council:

- 1) Awards a contract to Kleinfelder for the investigation of the Fletcher Parkway Slope Failure including preparation of design, alternative repair recommendations, and cost estimates to perform remedial repairs to the slope to minimize safety hazards for the traveling public. Kleinfelder's proposal is included herewith as Attachment #1.
- 2) Authorizes the City Manager to negotiate a professional services agreement with Kleinfelder for the above work.
- 3) Appropriates \$76,000 from the Gas Tax Fund to compensate Kleinfelder for a preliminary safety assessment performed in March 2017 and to prepare the above study.
- 4) Directs staff to place temporary traffic control devices to direct traffic away from the northerly shoulder to allow a safe zone for any future mud flows until a permanent repair recommendation can be brought back to City Council for consideration.

BACKGROUND: Following the intense rain storms in January and February 2017, Street Maintenance staff discovered a substantial slope failure on westbound Fletcher Parkway between Loma Portal Drive and Westwind Drive. Initial observations revealed that mud flows were contained by previously placed restraining devices installed the prior year for this purpose. It was evident, by the extent of damage to the slope facing Fletcher Parkway, that the restraining devices were in danger of failure and any future mud flows could present a hazard to the traveling public in the westbound direction.

Following discovery of the slope failure, Public Works staff issued a task order to Kleinfelder using the On-Call, As-Needed authority granted and awarded to Kleinfelder by the City Council on October 13, 2015. Staff requested Kleinfelder make an initial safety assessment to include an assessment of slope stability, the likelihood of future mud flow occurrences, and the hazards to the traveling public.

Kleinfelder's report concluded that there was an on-going threat to public safety and that westbound traffic should be directed away from the shoulder to provide a buffer for future slope failures to occur without endangering the public. Kleinfelder's report is included herewith as Attachment #2.

The City Traffic Engineer has prepared a temporary solution for re-channeling the westbound traffic by closing the shoulder and providing a seven-foot buffer while maintaining the existing three lanes westbound.

FISCAL IMPACT: Staff requests that the City Council appropriates \$76,000 of unallocated Gas Tax funding for preparation of design, alternative repair recommendations, and cost estimates to perform remedial repairs to Fletcher Parkway Slope. This project will be budgeted in the Transportation Capital Improvement fund (550000).

As authorized in your Task Order #4 letter dated March 2, 2017, we are providing our evaluation of the landslide that occurred on February 28, 2017 along the westbound side of Fletcher Parkway in the City of El Cajon (City). Our evaluation consisted of a limited field observations to ascertain the level of risk to public safety, and preparation of this report to provide our opinion on the current site conditions.

BACKGROUND

On February 27, 2017, the City experienced high-intensity rainfall resulting in multiple slope failures along the north side of Fletcher Parkway between Loma Portal and Westwind Drive. Debris flows and slumping reportedly occurred the morning of February 28 following 1.5 inches of rain. City staff determined the slide conditions created a hazard to public safety, and consequently closed the number three lane on westbound Fletcher parkway to reduce the risk to public safety.

In 2012, Shepardson Engineering Associates, Inc. studied two slopes to the east of the site in 2012 which encountered similar stability issues. These were within previously mapped landslides. The results of their study were presented in a report titled Report of Geotechnical Consulting Services, As-needed Services, PO #90907, Job #3375, Task No. 1, Fletcher Parkway Erosion and Debris Flow Repair, El Cajon, California, dated April 25, 2012.

The Shepardson report provided several alternatives for permanent repair of the slides which also included installation of a debris fence at the base of the slope. We have not reviewed the As-Built conditions of the repairs, but we understand that the recommended debris fence was constructed below the two eastern areas sometime between May and December of 2015.

SITE RECONNAISSNCE

The City notified Kleinfelder of the slide and hazardous conditions on March 2, 2017. Our Certified Engineering Geologist and Senior Geotechnical Engineer conducted an initial site visit that afternoon and on the following day on March 3, 2017. The results of our field geologic mapping

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are provided in Figure 1. A brief description of our observations and notes from topographic plans provided by the City are provided below:

- The location of the subject slide is approximately 1,500 feet west of Loma Portal Drive and 1,580 feet east of Westwind Drive. This corresponds to City roadway STA 10+50 to 13+00.
- The length of the impacted slope at this location is approximately 250 feet long.
- The subject slope is the eastern portion of a cut slope constructed for Fletcher Parkway that is about 500 feet in length along the road and 180 feet along top of the cut.
- The impacted portion of the cut slope varies in height from about 10 to 70 feet. Elevations at the maximum slope height on the west vary from approximately 660 to 730 feet (MSL), with the natural slope rising to a wide bench at approximately El. 748.
- Typical inclination of the cut slope is approximately 1.1:1 (Horizontal to vertical), with some local distressed areas at 0.5:1 or steeper.
- Natural slopes adjacent to and above the cut slope have inclinations of approximately 2.5:1 to 3:1.
- A brow ditch was not observed at the top of slope, however, a fence at the property line was observed approximately 20 feet from top of cut.
- Recent debris has entirely filled the capacity of the portions of the existing 3-foot high
 debris fence and likely overtopped the fence. The overflow material was likely washed
 down the existing brow ditch at the base of the slope and continued down Fletcher
 Parkway or possibly removed by City maintenance crews.
- Drainage ravines were observed to be starting to form in localized areas from the continued runoff.

GEOLOGIC CONDITIONS

Based on our field observations, and our review of published geologic maps and aerial photographs, the site is not located within a mapped landslide and nor did we find field indications that the site is encompassed within a larger landslide mass. However, numerous landslides have been previously mapped in the area, including immediately to the east where the Shepardson study was performed. The subject slope is within Mission Valley Formation and Stadium Conglomerate. A majority of the distress is within the clayey sand portion of the Mission Valley Formation. The portion of the slope within the Stadium Conglomerate in the western and upper slope elevations did not experience as much distress.

CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on our site reconnaissance and review of the referenced report and geologic maps, the subject slide appears to be a surficial debris slide, roughly 2 to 5 feet in thickness. The recent debris flows on the lower portion of the slope have resulted in over-steepened areas which are likely to continue to propagate up the slope. Several areas just above the slide have about 2 feet of roots exposed in a near-vertical condition. Based on the amount of vegetation observed within the slide debris and lack of remaining roots in many areas, we suspect that the slide plane was below the root zone. The current lack of vegetation in the lower portion of the slope makes it more susceptible to surficial erosion. The exposed root zone, lack of underlying restraint from the debris slide, and the potential for continued surfical erosion create the potential for sequential propagation up the slope. The size of each event is very difficult to estimate and beyond the scope of this assessment.

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Localized areas that have not recently slumped may fail in the future similar to those observed during our site reconnaissance. Debris flows are possible in the coming months, both immediately following rains and a lag time following rains. Additional debris would likely overtop the debris fence and enter the drainage ditch and possibly the traffic lanes.

It is our opinion that debris entering the traffic lanes could be a life safety issue, especially with speeds of 40 mph and limited line of sight on a curve. Accordingly, we recommend that barriers such as k-rails be installed at least several feet into the road/shoulder. At this location, the lane width is 18 to 19 feet and appears there is enough room to maintain a standard lane width of 12 feet. As our study primarily addresses the potential for debris to enter the roadway, City staff or their safety expert should address the safety impacts to the public.

We also recommend conducting periodic site visits to continue monitoring and evaluate slope stability. A geotechnical investigation, including potential borings, test pits, laboratory testing and engineering analysis should be conducted to provide recommendations for a more permanent resolution.

LIMITATIONS

This report has been prepared for the exclusive use of the City and their consultants for specific application to the subject project. The findings, conclusions and recommendations presented in this report were prepared in accordance with generally accepted geotechnical engineering practice. No warranty, express or implied, is made.

The scope of services was limited to the field observations described in this report. It should be recognized that definition and evaluation of subsurface conditions are difficult. Judgments leading to conclusions and recommendations are generally made with incomplete knowledge of the subsurface conditions present due to the limitations of data from field studies.

Kleinfelder offers various levels of investigative and engineering services to suit the varying needs of different clients. Although risk can never be eliminated, more detailed and extensive studies yield more information, which may help understand and manage the level of risk. Since detailed study and analysis involves greater expense, our clients participate in determining levels of service, which provide information for their purposes at acceptable levels of risk. The City should discuss the issues addressed in this report with Kleinfelder, so that the issues are understood and applied in a manner consistent with the tolerance of risk. The data contained in this report are based on our field observations and our present knowledge of the local conditions. It is possible that soil or groundwater conditions could vary between or beyond the area of our observations.

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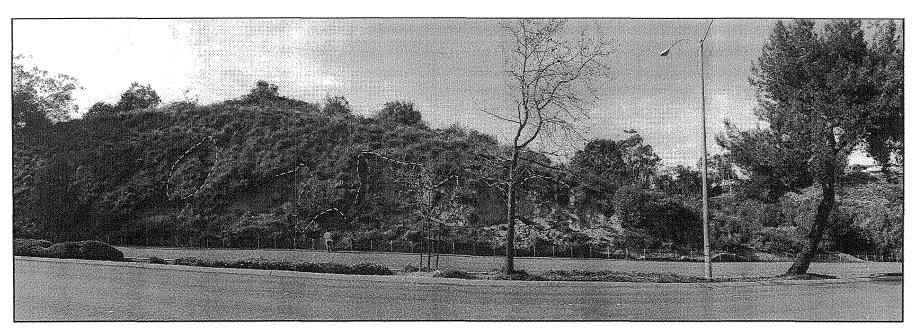
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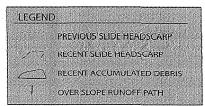
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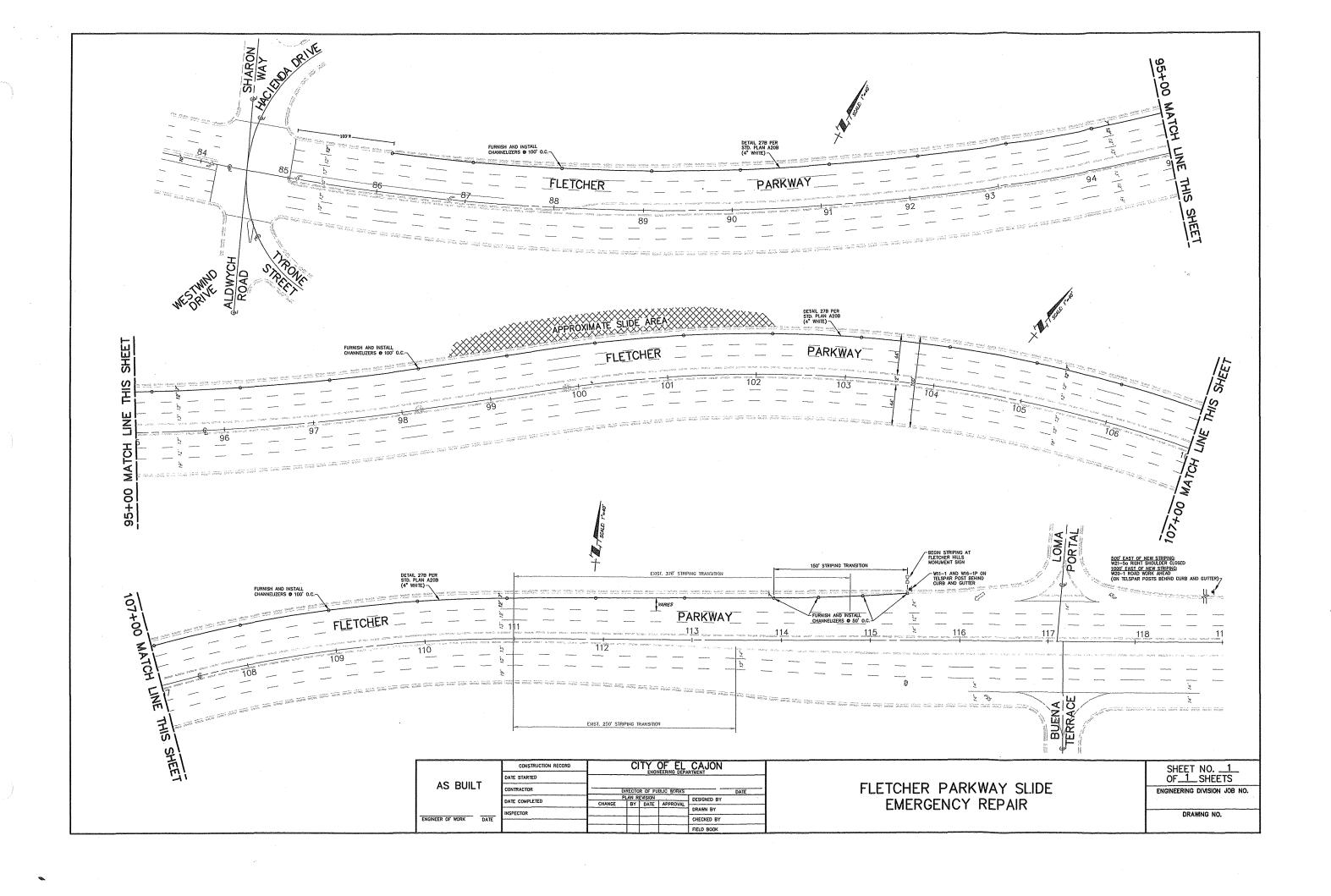

In response to your request, Kleinfelder is pleased to present this proposal to perform a geotechnical investigation of the slopes along westbound Fletcher Parkway between approximate Stations 98+00 to 115+00. Based on our discussions, we will evaluate the recent slope failures that occurred on February 27, 2017. We recently completed a site reconnaissance of the subject slope, and presented our recommendations to the City in our letter dated March 22, 2017.

Kleinfelder is committed to providing quality service to its clients, commensurate with their wants, needs and desired level of risk. If a portion of this proposal does not meet the needs of the Client, or if those needs have changed, Kleinfelder will consider appropriate modifications, subject to the standards of care to which we adhere as professionals. PROPOSED SCOPE OF WORK

Our scope of work will include providing geotechnical recommendations for several mitigation options of the existing slide area. This includes drilling of borings, laboratory testing of soil samples, geotechnical analysis, and preparation of a final report. Specifically, our services will include the following tasks:

Task 1 – Field Exploration

- Mark-out of boring locations and evaluate existing underground utilities with underground Service Alert (USA). In addition, a private utility locator will be contracted to clear each boring location.
- A traffic control plan will be developed to detour traffic around our boring locations, and will be submitted along with our encroachment permit. We will utilize the services of a traffic control subcontractor during our field exploration to implement the proposed traffic control system. 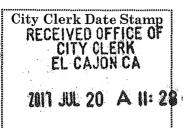

RESOLUTION ORDERING VACATION OF A PUBLIC ROAD EASEMENT AT WEST MAIN STREET NEAR DEWANE DRIVE

WHEREAS, in 1978, The West Main Group dedicated a public road easement to the City of El Cajon (the "City") for a potential future realignment of West Main Street, and in 1994, the City constructed street improvements on West Main Street, but did not realign the street; and

WHEREAS, the City Traffic Engineer has determined that West Main Street is functioning well and provides an adequate level of service, and that it will be unnecessary to realign the street in the future, and it is therefore in the best interest of the City to vacate the public road easement at this time; and

WHEREAS, the property owner of the parcel that surrounds the easement has submitted a proposal to develop the property, but the easement hinders the development of the parcel as it bisects the property on the west side and prevents full use of the western portion of the property; and

WHEREAS, the easement extends from West Main Street toward the northwest and terminates at the El Monte Pipeline Easement, which is owned and operated by the City of San Diego; and

WHEREAS, the proposed development is adjacent to, but does not impinge upon the El Monte Pipeline Easement; and the City of San Diego has been notified of the City's intent to vacate the public road easement and of the proposed development, and has not objected to either; and

WHEREAS, the California Streets and Highways Code permits the vacation of a public easement under specific conditions; and

WHEREAS, sections 8320 through 8325 of the California Streets and Highways Code provide that the City Council may vacate a public easement following the procedures outlined in the Code; and

WHEREAS, on June 27, 2017, the City Council approved Resolution No. 057-17, a Resolution of Intention to Vacate a Public Road Easement at West Main Street Near Dewane Drive and to Set a Date for a Public Hearing to Receive Testimony for the Intention to Vacate, and set July 25, 2017, as the date to hear testimony from the public as to the disposition of the easement; and

WHEREAS, on July 25, 2017, a public hearing was held, at which time no persons spoke in opposition; and

WHEREAS, said vacation is consistent with the General Plan of the City of El Cajon.

- 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct.

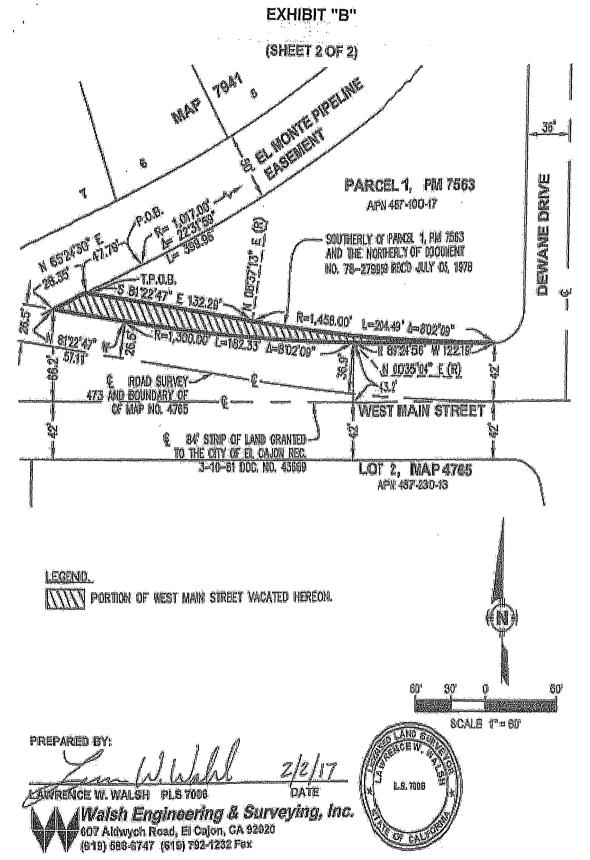

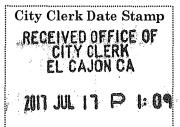

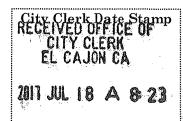
