Heartland Fire Appoints Steve Swaney as Fire Chief

This past October, Steve Swaney was selected as Heartland Fire & Rescue's Fire Chief. Heartland Fire serves the communities of El Cajon, La Mesa, and Lemon Grove by providing shared management of the agencies' fire protection and prevention, emergency medical services, and disaster preparedness.

Chief Swaney, 55, began working for the City of El Cajon, and later Heartland Fire & Rescue, in 1985. Chief Swaney most recently served as a Division Chief responsible for daily fire station operations. Chief Swaney said "It is an honor to have been chosen as the new Fire Chief and I am excited for the opportunity to lead such a great organization!"

Chief Swaney previously served as the Fire Chief for the Julian Cuyamaca Fire Protection District. He has been heavily involved with canine search and rescue throughout his career, is a certified FEMA Canine evaluator, and a lead instructor for the FEMA Canine Search Specialist School. Swaney has frequently served as a commander in response to both regional and statewide fire events.

New at Parkway Plaza

El Cajon's Parkway Plaza mall has recently added several new stores, including Carter's, OshKosh B'Gosh, Miniso (a Japan-based designer brand), and Stubborn Poke.

Hampton Inn and Marketplace Coming Soon

Construction of the Hampton Inn by Hilton, the City's second major hotel, is progressing quickly! The 96-room hotel is expected to be completed this winter. The Excel Hotel Group, who successfully built the Courtyard Marriott in El Cajon, is also building the new Hampton Inn.

On the same site, construction of Brixton Capital Group's Fletcher Marketplace is expected to be completed this summer. The Marketplace will feature both retail and restaurant spaces. New restaurants will include California Fish Grill, Blaze Pizza, Urbane Cafe, and an In-N-Out drive-thru.

The hotel and new commercial buildings are both located on the corner of Magnolia Avenue and Fletcher Parkway across from the Parkway Plaza mall.

Cornerstone - New Mixed-Use Housing Units in Downtown El Cajon

Construction of Cornerstone Place—a 70-unit mixed-use housing project in downtown El Cajon—is well underway. The development provides veterans and families with one- and three-bedroom affordable apartment options.

The development also includes outdoor spaces, a community room, and ground floor office and commercial spaces. The project is expected to be completed in 2020.

Welcome to the Community Development Department



“The City of El Cajon’s Community Development Department is dedicated to working every day for a better El Cajon,” according to the City’s Community Development Director, Tony Shute. The Department provides for the orderly growth, development, and redevelopment of the City through the application and implementation of the General Plan, zoning and building codes, and housing programs.

Ultimately, the Community Development Department’s objectives are to promote growth, enhance and protect neighborhoods, ensure safe housing, encourage economic development, and to create a vibrant and safe community.

To accomplish this, a team of professional staff works together to make El Cajon a better city!

A Day in the life of a Building Inspector

The Building and Fire Safety team in the Community Development Department implements state and city codes and standards related to building construction, fire and life safety, and property maintenance. To understand what these employees do on a day-to-day basis, we interviewed L.C. Wright, the City’s Housing Inspector.

As the Housing Inspector, what are your job duties? I am responsible for inspecting apartments for maintenance of appliances, electrical and plumbing hazards, fire protection, heat sources, infestations, illegal dwelling units, as well as exterior conditions. This is to ensure El Cajon residents live in a residence that meets the minimum housing codes established by the State and the City.

Why is your job important to the City? El Cajon has a large number of multi-family housing (apartments and duplexes). As an inspector, I ensure that the living conditions are safe for residents.

What accomplishments are you most proud of in your work? I am most proud of my work when a housing development is in need of work, and the property owner makes the repairs needed to bring the property into compliance. I enjoy working with the apartment owners and managers to focus attention on making housing safe for all.

As an Inspector, do you have any advice for tenants? Prospective tenants should not take possession of a rental unit that is not complete, until all corrections from your walk-thru are considered satisfied. Many apartment managers require renter’s insurance. If not, it is recommended that tenants purchase a policy.

Because of your work, do you have any advice for apartment managers or property owners? Property management companies and owners should keep their properties current with housing code updates and requirements. I can help them know what the codes are —just ask!

How should someone report a problem they are having with their apartment? Issues should be reported to Management first. It is also important to always put your concerns in writing.

A Day in the Life of a City Planner

A planner's day may start with a staff meeting to discuss the management of a new development proposal, or might include a team meeting with engineers, architects, and landscape architects to review the specifics of a plan. A planner's role is to provide the "big picture" and to relate the project to various goals and guidelines, such as ordinances or design review, in order to achieve a final project that meets the expectations of the community and City Council. This might include quality design, environmental considerations, support for the local economy, or equitable access.



To better understand the work, we interviewed Lorena Cordova about what a day in the life of an Associate Planner looks like.

What are your job duties? I work in the City's Project Assistance Center (PAC) in the Community Development Department. As a member of the PAC team, I primarily assist the public by providing development information, reviewing building permits, processing planning permits and working with property owners and developers on development projects. As a member of Planning, I also update the City's Municipal Code (the City's rules and standards), provide technical support for community projects, and manage planning grant projects. Ultimately, my goal is to assist

residents and business owners navigate the planning process.

Why is your job important to the City? As a Department, we provide information and guidance to business and property owners, residents, developers and industry-professionals about the City's land use and development standards. My job is also important because I ensure that the City's vision for a better city, is implemented in a consistent and transparent manner.

What accomplishments are you most proud of in your work? I am most proud of being able to help people on a daily basis. I help people open new businesses and process permits to build new residential, commercial and industrial projects. I also get to work with community groups and present information on various topics. In addition, I enjoy working with grants that benefit the community at-large. These grants often provide funding to improve safety and walkability throughout the City.

As an Associate Planner, do you have any advice for home owners? Yes, please don't hesitate to email, call, or walk-in to City Hall for general zoning information. We are here to help! People will often spend time, money and energy trying to correct a zoning issue without first clarifying what the City's regulations are. We are here to help, and in many cases, we can help save someone money in the long run if they reach out early in the planning or building process.

City's Housing Programs - Helping First Time Homebuyers



If you dream of owning a home in El Cajon and have not owned a home or property anywhere in the last three years, the City of El Cajon may be able help you fulfill that dream. The City administers a First Time Homebuyer Program that provides loans for qualified low-income households for down-payment assistance to help purchase a new or existing home within

the City limits. Loans of up to \$100,000 for a single-family home or up to \$50,000 for a condominium may be available.

City housing programs have income and qualification restrictions that may not be the same for all programs. Funding is limited and loan terms are subject to change without notice. To obtain more information, please visit the City's website, or call (619) 441-1710.

Housing Rehabilitation Loans

Did you know that the City of El Cajon also administers a Housing Rehabilitation Loan Program? The program provides loans for qualified low-income homeowners to rehabilitate their single-family residences and mobile homes. Homes must be located within city limits, and mobile homes must be located in one of eight eligible mobile home parks in the City. Loans are deferred and zero interest, as long as the household is in compliance with the loan terms. The loan amount can be up to \$50,000 for a single-family residence and up to \$20,000 for mobile homes.



In addition to income and maximum property value restrictions, the homeowner must have owned the property for at least one year. Other restrictions apply. Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)



As seen in the news, damage caused by natural disasters, such as earthquakes and wildfires, can be devastating. Being prepared for disaster is key to survival, and the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) program is an ideal program to help you prepare. Training topics include fire safety, disaster medical operations, light search and rescue, disaster psychology, and terrorism. Following a significant disaster, emergency personnel may not be immediately available. In this situation, members of the community may be on their own for several days or longer. CERT volunteers respond in the period immediately after a disaster when response resources are overwhelmed or delayed. Calling 9-1-1



Many communities, including El Cajon, have experienced significant increases in 9-1-1 calls. False 9-1-1 calls threatens public safety for other callers with who may have urgent or life threatening emergencies.

When should you call 9-1-1?

- MEDICAL EMERGENCY such as chest pains, seizures or bleeding
- CRIME in-progress including robbery, burglary, prowler or bleeding
- FIRE including structure, vehicle or brush fires
- LIFE THREATENING situation such traffic collisions

What to say when 9-1-1 answers

- STAY CALM and SPEAK CLEARLY
- LOCATION – Tell the dispatcher where is the emergency
- EMERGENCY – Tell the dispatcher what is the emergency
- YOUR INFORMATION – Provide your name, phone number, and address
- STAY ON THE LINE to answer questions until the dispatcher tells you to hang up

Police Department Citizen's Academy

Get to know your local police department by enrolling in the El Cajon Police Department's Citizen's Academy! The eight-week program allows participants to learn how the City's police department functions from the inside-out. Students learn about topics including the history of law enforcement, the criminal justice system, and crime scene investigation during weekly class meetings. Students also participate in hands-on exercises such as conducting traffic stops, dusting for fingerprints, and firearms simulation. This annual academy is often held in May or June and concludes with a graduation ceremony. Classes are from 6 p.m. to 8:30 p.m. in the Community Room of the El Cajon Police Department, 100 Civic Center Way. El Cajon Police Teen Academy



The El Cajon Police Department's Teen Police Academy is a specialized program designed to engage teens in a variety of interactive law enforcement training. This 80-hour class gives teens the opportunity to see how their local police department operates on a daily basis through a variety of presentations and activities, such as a ride-a-long in a patrol car and a sit-a-long in the 9-1-1 Communications Center. Students learn about Law enforcement related careers such as being a police officer, police dispatcher, forensic lab technician, as well as careers working with police records and evidence. Students also see demonstrations by the SWAT team, K-9 Unit, and crime scene investigators.

Teen academy attendees also participate in a group community project and receive credit for community service hours. Overall, this program allows students to work closely with officers and other police department personnel to help foster relationships, trust, and understanding between local teens and police officers. 1 What is a Fixed Winter Rate?

Every year, the City takes the Winter Rate Average use of water, typically from November through March.

2 What is my Account Type?

Look here to see if you have Fixed Winter Average or have a Consumption Account Type.

3 Example: Winter Rate Average Calculation

The average use of water used from November through March is 16.5 units. To find the average, you add $17 + 16 = 33$.
 $33 \div 2 = 16.5$.

(Water usage can be found on your water bill).

4 Winter Rate Average Calculation

The City charges \$4.49 per consumption unit. Using the invoice above:
 $16.5 \text{ Units (Water User)} \times \$4.49 \text{ (Consumption Rate)} = \$74.09 \text{ (Sewer Charge)} + \$11.30 \text{ (Base Charge)} = \85.39 .

5 Due Date Penalty

Bills not paid by the due date will be assessed a 10% penalty.

The new consumption rate goes into effect every July and is used for 12 months.

If you have consumed less water than your set rate for two consecutive cycles (four months), please contact us and we can lower your consumption rate.

Keeping El Cajon Clean

Every year, thousands of pounds of trash and debris ends up in local creeks and rivers. In El Cajon, this trash flows into the Forrester Creek, the San Diego River, and ultimately to our beaches and ocean. Most of the trash that washes into local creeks and rivers flows into storm drains.



One way to protect our waterways is to always place garbage in a trash can. If you are not by a trash can, hold onto your trash until you are. Throwing away your trash properly can significantly reduce the amount of pollution that enters creeks and rivers.

Another way to reduce water pollution is to throw away cigarette butts safely in a trash can. Research shows that cigarette butts account for one in five items collected during beach cleanups. Cigarette butts thrown onto streets, parking lots, and sidewalks get washed into storm drains. Once submerged in water, toxic chemicals from cigarette butts leach from the cigarette filter, threatening water quality and marine life.

Prevent Pollution Caused by Irrigation Runoff

Over watering your landscaping may result in excess irrigation water and pollutants washing into storm drains. The excess irrigation water that flows off your property and over curbs and into gutters can pick up pollutants, including sediment, fertilizers, pesticides, trash, and bacteria. Fertilizers and pesticides that wash into waterways can poison fish and contaminate the waterways. Grass clippings rich in nutrients such as phosphorus or nitrogen decomposing leaves, can cause algae blooms and bacteria growth that can degrade water quality.



Simple Water Saving Tips:

- Water your lawn 2-days per week and 5-8-minutes per day or less.
- Water during late-night to early morning hours (6 p.m. - 10 a.m.).
- Do not water lawn for 48-hours after measurable rainfall.
- Adjust watering times and schedules to ensure that the appropriate amount of water is being used for your landscaping and avoid watering on windy days.
- Fertilize and reseed your lawn in the middle or late spring.
- Remove weeds from your lawn as they rob your lawn of water.
- Maintain sprinkler heads and nozzles in good working condition.
- Adjust your sprinklers to avoid spraying sidewalks or driveway.
- Mix mulch into the soil to help retain moisture and help reduce the need for frequent watering.
- Use an automatic timer to program each water zone for only the amount of water needed.

Landscaping generally places the highest demand on water resources. Irrigation is often needlessly wasted due to runoff and evaporation. The amount of water required to maintain landscaping depends on the types (i.e., lawn, flowers, trees and shrubs) and locations of the plants. The length of time spent watering your landscaping should reflect the plant's needs.

Taking a few simple steps can significantly reduce our impact on local creeks, rivers, beaches and oceans while saving you money.
