#### BACKGROUND:

On February 25, 2020, the City Council awarded the Pipeline Replacement 2019 Project to Tri-Group Construction and Development, Inc., in the amount of \$859,765. The project scope included the replacement of sewer and storm drain pipelines, inlets, and clean-outs at various locations throughout the City. City staff evaluated field conditions during construction and identified opportunities for cost savings resulting in a total construction cost of \$755,897.26. Construction was completed on October 30, 2020, and acceptance of the project is recommended.

#### FISCAL IMPACT:

The fiscal impact of the construction project was \$755,897.26. Sufficient funds were available for the project in the City's Wastewater Program Fund (650900-WW61019). The project was completed below the FY2020-21 budgeted amount for construction, which was \$859,765.

#### **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the City Council receives the Treasurer's Report for the quarter ending December 31, 2020.

#### BACKGROUND:

Per the City's investment policy, the latest quarterly Treasurer's Report is presented for Council receipt and approval.

Investment Trends/Economy – The Federal Open Market Committee (FOMC) summarized its position on the economy with the following comments from their January 27, 2021, Monetary Policy release.

"The COVID-19 pandemic is causing tremendous human and economic hardship across the United States and around the world. The pace of the recovery in economic activity and employment has moderated in recent months, with weakness concentrated in the sectors most adversely affected by the pandemic. Weaker demand and earlier declines in oil prices have been holding down consumer price inflation. Overall financial conditions remain accommodative, in part reflecting policy measures to support the economy and the flow of credit to U.S. households and businesses.

The path of the economy will depend significantly on the course of the virus, including progress on vaccinations. The ongoing public health crisis continues to weigh on economic activity, employment, and inflation, and poses considerable risks to the economic outlook."

A January 28, 2021 Wall Street Journal article, U.S. Economy Shrank in 2020 Despite Fourth-Quarter Growth by Harriet Torry, summarized the events of the last year:

"The U.S. economy shrank in 2020 for the first time since the financial crisis, but grew rapidly in the fourth quarter and is forecast to continue recovering following its worst year since the 1940s.

A strong rebound in the second half of 2020 wasn't enough to overcome the economic shock created by the pandemic earlier in the year. Measured year-over-year, the economy contracted 3.5% last year, the largest decline since just after World War II and the first since 2009 in the wake of the financial crisis. Measured from the fourth quarter to the same quarter a year earlier the economy shrank 2.5%.

Fourth-quarter U.S. gross domestic product—the value of all goods and services produced across the economy, adjusted for seasonality and inflation—grew at a 4% annual rate, the Commerce Department said on Thursday. That joined a record 33.4% annual rate of growth in the third quarter to further reduce losses from earlier in the pandemic."

Citing the January 26, 2021 release from the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the national unemployment in December was 6.7%, up from 3.6% in December 2019. This is down from April's high of 14.7% however. For comparison, unemployment rates prior to the start of the current public health crisis were 3.5% in February and 4.4% in March.

U.S. Treasuries – As of December 31, 2021 the yield was 0.12% for a 2-year Treasury and 0.36% for a 5-year Treasury. Compared to the prior year, the 2-year Treasuries decreased 145 basis points and the 5-year Treasuries decreased 133 basis points.

U.S. Government Agencies – At quarter end, the yield was 0.13% for a 2-year and 0.42% for a 5-year Federal Agency investment. The City's investment portfolio, in large part, is comprised of U.S. Government Agency securities because they typically offer a slightly higher return than U.S. Treasuries.

LAIF, County, and CAMP Pools –The quarter to date yield for the second quarter of fiscal year 2021 was 0.58% and 1.02% for LAIF and County Pools, respectively. The CAMP cash pool yielded 0.15% during the same period.

Outlook & Strategy –The current economic environment presents challenges to investing public funds. The current strategy is to focus on the preservation of capital and to maintain flexibility in order to maximize investment opportunities when they materialize. As they become available, and the City's cash flow needs are met, investing funds in securities will continue with the City's investment advisors, Public Financial Management (PFM). The CAMP pool is currently rated AAA. No rating is provided for LAIF, but it is expected it would also achieve an AAA rating.

Report Presentation – This report is presented in the following sections:

Operating Cash – The Union Bank Master Account is the City's main checking account. The City also utilizes a merchant account with U.S. Bank for receiving credit card payments. Funds are automatically transferred daily from U.S. Bank to the City's main checking account at Union Bank.

Operating Investments – The City's operating investments are invested in CAMP portfolio investments (91.99%) earning 1.79%, LAIF (6.62%) earning 0.58%, and the County pool (0.00%) earning 1.02%. The remainder in the CAMP investment pool (1.38%) earning 0.15%. The investment portfolio make-up of LAIF and CAMP are attached. In addition to maximizing yield, these investments provide for safety and liquidity in meeting the City's operational needs.

Successor Agency Investments – The Successor Agency no longer holds operating investments. The Bank of New York Mellon is the Trustee, the required bond accounts have a combined market value of \$1,305,883.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Interest earned for the first quarter of the fiscal year, on a cash basis, was \$334,475.

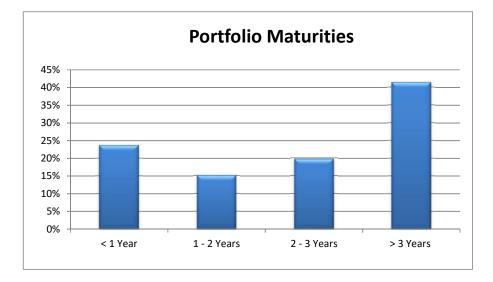

- Note (1): The Local Agency Investment Fund (LAIF) is a voluntary investment alternative for California's local governments and special districts authorized by the California Government Code. LAIF is managed by the State Treasurer's Office with oversight by the Local Agency Investment Advisory Board. All securities in LAIF are purchased under the authority of Government Code Sections 16430 and 16480.8. LAIF is part of the State Treasurer's Pooled Money Investment Account (PMIA). The PMIA Investment Policy is guided by the goals of portfolio safety/diversification, liquidity, and yield.
- Note (2): The San Diego County Investment Pool (Pool) is a local government money fund originally created in 1853 by the County Board of Supervisors to invest the assets of the County, 42 K-12 school districts, 5 community colleges, and over 160 other public agencies located within the County. The Pool is managed by the County's Treasurer's Office in accordance with State law and is reviewed by a ten-member Oversight Committee. The Pool limits investments to fixed-income securities and maintains liquidity needs through maturity requirements.
- Note (3): The California Asset Management Program (CAMP) is a California Joint Powers Authority established in 1989 to provide California public agencies with professional investment services. The CAMP Pool is a permitted investment for all local agencies under California Government Code Section 53601(p). CAMP is directed by a Board of Trustees, which is made up of experienced local government finance directors and treasurers.

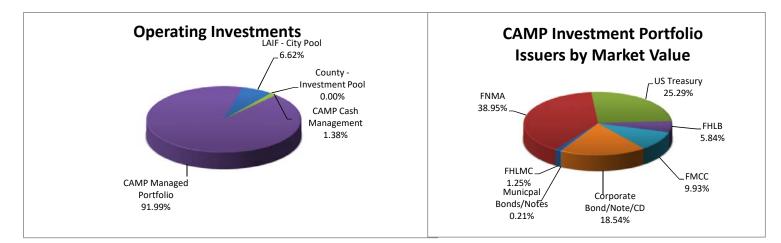

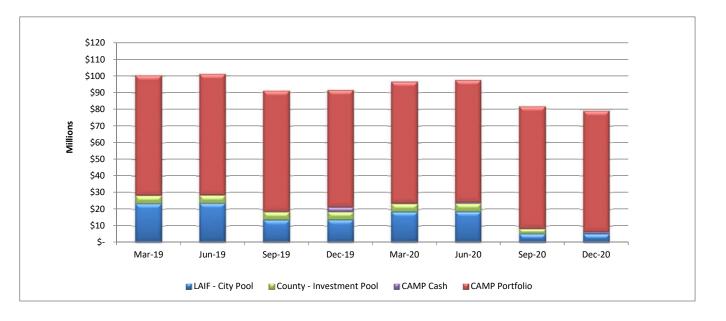

# Pooled Money Investment Account Monthly Portfolio Composition <sup>(1)</sup> 12/31/20 \$107.4 billion

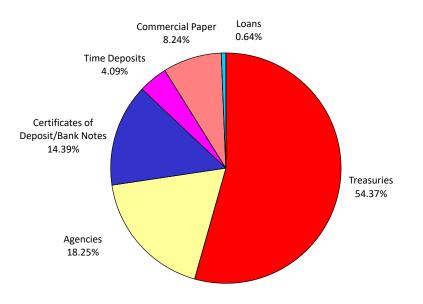

# **RECOMMENDATION:**

# BACKGROUND:

The Landscape and Facility Maintenance contract provides for the maintenance of landscaped areas and specific open spaces in the City. The bid was originally advertised on May 14, 2020. Two responses were received and opened on June 9, 2020. However, due to the configuration of the specifications and budgetary limitations, the City Council authorized the rejection and re-bid on July 14, 2020.

Upon re-bidding for the services, two responses were received and opened at 2:00 p.m. on December 3, 2020. The apparent low bidder provided a bid bond that was not properly executed, which shall deem the bid non-responsive. The second low bidder listed a subcontractor with an expired contractor's license. Furthermore, both responses exceeded the City's budget for this scope of work.

As such, it would be in the City's best interest to reject all bids. Rather than issue a re-bid of the specifications, City staff is exploring alternative procurement options such as piggybacking on another local agency's contract. Piggybacking is a type of intergovernmental cooperative purchase in which an agency is extended the same pricing and terms of a competitively-bid contract entered into by another agency.

City staff will return to City Council for approval at a future date. The summary of bids is attached and complete proposals are on file in the Purchasing Division.

WHEREAS, the second low bidder listed a subcontractor with an expired contractor's license, and both responses exceeded the City's budget for this scope of work; and

WHEREAS, upon review of the bid responses, City staff determined that it would be in the City's best interest to reject all bids and explore alternative procurement options; and

WHEREAS, this procurement is recommended as an exception to the City's competitive bidding requirement, pursuant to El Cajon Municipal Code section 3.20.010(C)(6); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Public Contract Code section 20166 and El Cajon Municipal Code section 3.20.080 the City Council, in its discretion, may reject any bids presented; and

WHEREAS, staff recommends that the City Council rejects all bids and authorizes alternative procurement options; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believes it to be in the best interests of the City to reject all bids and direct staff to return at a future date with alternative procurement recommendations for the Project.

# **RECOMMENDATION:**

That the City Council adopts the next Resolution, in order, to:

- 1. Accept the grant, appropriate and expend funding in the amount of \$26,000 from the National Recreation & Park Association (NRPA) designed to support community play; and
- 2. Authorize the City Manager to execute a Memorandum of Understanding with NRPA.

# BACKGROUND:

The NRPA is supporting park and recreation agencies with \$26,000 grants designed to support community play in the form of physical activity, social connections or building community resilience. With funding support from the Target Corporation, only four cities in the nation were awarded this grant to provide residents with healthy living opportunities. This grant specifically targets underserved communities. Wells Park was the site selected as it met the US Census Tract requirements. The \$26,000 anticipated expense breakdown is as follows:

- \$7,500 Personnel
- \$2,500 Marketing (printing, promotional materials, advertising)
- \$2,500 Consulting
- \$6,000 Recreation/Sports Supplies

\$7,500 - Small/Medium Trailer for Transporting and Storing Recreation Supplies

The personnel cost reflects the City's Rec Squad operating free afterschool programming at Wells Park. The marketing and promotional materials will be used to promote the free services. The consultant will be used as a subject-matter expert to train staff and create systems to evaluate fitness and strength of the youth in the free afterschool program. Recreational and sports supplies will be used to purchase necessary sports, recreational and fitness equipment to introduce new physical activity skills to the participants. The trailer will be used to brand the program, transport and store the recreational supplies. Final grant report is due to the NRPA on May 31, 2021.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Grant funding in the amount of \$26,000 will be deposited in the Recreation Special Revenue Fund account (240000) and expenditures will be taken from that same account. Additionally, appropriations will be increased accordingly for this account. The grant funding will pay for personnel, supplies and services.

# A RESOLUTION OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL CAJON ACCEPTING A GRANT FROM THE NATIONAL RECREATION & PARK ASSOCIATION; AUTHORIZING THE CITY MANAGER TO EXECUTE A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING; AND APPROVING APPROPRIATION OF FUNDS FOR PERSONNEL, SUPPLIES AND SERVICES FOR THE OPERATION OF LOCAL RESIDENT PROGRAMS

WHEREAS, the National Recreation & Park Association ("NRPA"), with funding support from the Target Corporation, is awarding park and recreation agencies in underserved communities with \$26,000 grants designed to provide residents with healthy living opportunities in the form of physical activity, social connections and building community resilience (the "Grant"); and

WHEREAS, the City of El Cajon (the "City"), was awarded a Grant, and Wells Park was selected as it meets the US Census Tract requirements; and

WHEREAS, the Grant will be used to fund (1) City recreation personnel costs for operating a free afterschool programming at Wells Park; (2) marketing and promotional materials to promote the free services; (3) consultant funds for the cost of a subject-matter expert to train staff and create systems to evaluate fitness and strength of the youth in the free afterschool program; (4) recreational and sports supplies necessary to introduce new physical activity skills to the participants; (5) and the acquisition and set up of a trailer to brand the program, and to transport and store the recreational supplies; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believes it to be in the City's best interests to accept the Grant in the amount of \$26,000 from NRPA in order to provide residents with healthy living opportunities.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL CAJON AS FOLLOWS:

1. The above recitals are true and correct, and are the findings of the City Council.

2. The City Council hereby accepts the NRPA Grant, with the funds to be deposited in the Recreation Special Revenue Fund account and appropriated for personnel, supplies and services as recommended by staff.

3. The City Manager is hereby authorized to execute a memorandum of understanding with National Recreation and Park Association, substantially in the form as presented to the City Council at this meeting, with such changes as may be approved by the City Manager. The City Manager is further authorized to execute such documents, reports, and agreements necessary by the award of the Grant and the expenditure of the Grant funds as generally described herein.



### MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING

This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU), dated February 5, 2021 (Effective Date), is made between **National Recreation and Park Association**, a New York not-for-profit corporation and Section 501(c)(3) organization located at 22377 Belmont Ridge Road, Ashburn, Virginia, 20148 (NRPA) and the **City of El Cajon**, a California charter city and municipal corporation, acting through its Parks & Recreation Department, a provider of park, recreation, or community services in El Cajon, California (Grantee).

#### 1. Purpose

The purpose of this MOU is to confirm approval of the terms governing the acceptance and use of Twenty-Six Thousand Dollars (\$26,000) made available to Grantee for the implementation of the project selected for grant funding (Project): Wells Park Mobile Play Project.

Made possible through the support of the Target Corporation, NRPA is managing the administration of the Connecting Communities to Outdoor Play grant program (Program). Grants made through this Program are intended to improve access to physical activity and nature for low-income youth and families and create more resilient communities.

Having been selected as a recipient of Grant Funds through this Program, Grantee is required to accept the terms contained within this MOU in order to receive the Grant Funds as a grant recipient.

#### 2. Project Funding

- **A.** Within thirty (30) days upon execution of this MOU and delivery to NRPA, NRPA will send Grantee a check in the amount of Twenty-Six Thousand Dollars (\$26,000).
- **B.** Grant Funds will be distributed by NRPA.
- C. No matching funds are required.

#### 3. Grantee Requirements

Grantee will use the Grant Funds to:

- A. Implement Project at Wells Park, 1153 E. Madison Avenue, El Cajon, California 92020 in alignment with the application approved by NRPA for funding: El Cajon Parks and Recreation Department would like to expand critical hours of service programming using "Rec Squad" staff to run free recreational programing at Wells Park. El Cajon will leverage funding to purchase a trailer and recreational equipment, pay staff, market the program, and measure program effectiveness.
- B. Demonstrate progress toward project outcomes in February 2021.
- C. Complete installation of Project by May 31, 2021.
- **D.** Conduct local community outreach through web, social media, and local press release and share success stories, press releases, photos, videos, quotes, etc. with NRPA upon request. NRPA will provide a toolkit of sample content designed to support this outreach.
- **E.** Complete all project evaluation requirements. Requirements include:
  - Administer intercept surveys to community members/public who are users of the project onemonth post-improvements. Survey instructions and further details to be provided by NRPA.
- F. Submit final report via online template provided by NRPA by May 31, 2021 to include:
  - Narrative summary of the Project
  - Progress towards metrics and outcomes as outlined in proposal
  - Budget summary documenting how the grant funds were used
  - Any photos, local press coverage, videos, quotes and stories



#### 4. Promotion

NRPA and the Target Corporation may use the Grantee and/or park names, photos, and/or information in connection with the Project for promotional or other purposes associated with the Project, in any and all media, without limitation and without further payment, notification, or permission, except where prohibited by law. If the Grantee's photo release form does not cover promotional and other uses, NRPA can provide one upon request.

Grantee shall provide NRPA an opportunity to review and approve any statement, message or use of the Target Corporation logo related to this grant or Project in advance of its release to the public. NRPA will seek approval from Target for use of the Target corporation logo on behalf of grantees. Any use of Target corporation logos without prior approval is prohibited.

Any promotion, public announcement, or promotion relating to the Grant shall be subject to the prior review of NRPA and the Target Corporation.

#### 5. Limits of Liability

To the fullest extent permitted by applicable law, Grantee hereby releases the Target Corporation and NRPA, and each of their directors, officers, managers, members, employees, agents, attorneys, advisors, consultants, volunteers and other like parties (collectively the Support Parties), from any liability whatsoever relating to or arising out of the Project or the use of the Grant Funds. Grantee further waives any right to sue or bring any action of any kind against the Support Parties relating to or arising out of the Project or the use of the Support Parties' liability arises due to breach of contract, breach of warranty, or as a result of tortious conduct, including, but not limited to, negligence (of any kind), strict liability, statutory liability, or any other causes of action.

NRPA's liability, if any, arising out of or in any way related to the relationship and/or dealings between NRPA and Grantee, shall be limited to the payment amounts paid pursuant to this MOU. NRPA shall not be liable for any damages caused by or arising out of the acts or omissions of a third party.

#### 6. Indemnification

To the fullest extent permitted by applicable law, Grantee shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless the Support Parties from any and all causes of action, suits, settlements, judgments, liens, indebtedness, damages, losses, costs, expenses, fees (including attorney's fees and costs), penalties, claims, claims for relief, liabilities and demands of every kind, nature, and character (collectively, "Claims") relating to or arising out of: (i) Grantee's involvement in the development, planning, demolition, construction, installation, implementation, maintenance, repair and/or management of the Project; (ii) any failure by Grantee to comply with any applicable laws, rules and/or regulations (including, without limitation, building, safety and fire codes, etc.); (iii) Grantee's negligence, misconduct, or malfeasance of grantees or their agents or representatives; or (iv) any breach by Grantee of any agreement involving the Project or the use of the Grant Funds. In no event shall the Support Parties be liable for any punitive, exemplary, special, incidental, indirect or consequential damages of any kind (including, but not limited to loss of profits, loss of reputation and/or loss of current or prospective business advantage, even where such losses are characterized as direct damages) arising out of or in any way related to the relationship and/or dealings between the parties, regardless of whether the claim under which damages are sought is based upon contract, tort, negligence (of any kind), strict liability or otherwise, and regardless of whether the parties have been advised of the possibility of such damages at the time of contracting or otherwise.

#### 7. Confidentiality

During the term of this MOU, the parties may learn certain confidential information of each other. For purposes of this MOU, confidential information means the confidential and proprietary information, not generally known



by non-party personnel, used by the disclosing party and which is proprietary to the disclosing party, and includes, without limitation, the disclosing party's trade secret or proprietary personnel, financial, marketing and business information, including strategic, operations and other business plans or forecasts, and confidential information provided by the disclosing party regarding its employees, customers, vendors, sponsors and other contractors. The receiving party shall: (i) protect and safeguard the confidentiality of the disclosing party's confidential information with at least the same degree of care as the receiving party would protect its own confidential information, but in no event with less than a commercially reasonable degree of care; (ii) not use the disclosing party's confidential information, or permit it to be accessed or used, for any purpose other than to exercise its rights or perform its obligations under this MOU; and (iii) not disclose any such confidential information to any person, except to the receiving party's officers, employees, consultants, accountants, and legal advisors who are bound by written confidentiality obligations and have a need to know the confidential information to assist the receiving party, or act on its behalf, to exercise its rights or perform its obligations under this MOU.

### 8. Term

This MOU shall be effective as of the Effective Date hereof and shall continue until May 31, 2021 (the "Term") in accordance with Section 11.

#### 9. Use of Grant Funds

The Grantee shall use the full amount of the Grant Funds exclusively for the purposes set forth in Section 1. Unless otherwise agreed in writing by the Grantor, the Grantee shall return any portion of the Grant Funds and the income earned thereon that is not expended for such purposes in accordance with Section 11.

All unspent or uncommitted Grant Funds shall be invested in highly liquid investments (such as an interest-bearing bank account) with the primary objective being preserving the Grant Funds availability for the Project. Any interest or other income generated by the Grant Funds must be applied to the purposes described in the Grant Project.

The Grantee agrees not to use any portion of the grant or any income derived from the grant for the following:

- **A.** To carry on propaganda or otherwise attempt to influence legislation within the meaning of Section 4945(d)(1) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the Code);
- **B.** To influence the outcome of any specific public election or to carry on, directly or indirectly, any voter registration drive within the meaning of Section 4945(d)(2) of the Code;
- **C.** To provide a grant to an individual for travel, study, or similar purpose within the meaning of Section 4945(g) of the Code, without prior written approval of Grantor.
- **D.** Payments of salaries, other compensation, or expense reimbursement to employees of the Grantee within the scope of their employment do not constitute "grants" for these purposes and are not subject to these restrictions;
- **E.** Except as expressly may be authorized in the approved Project, to provide a grant to any other organization without prior written approval of the Grantor; or
- **F.** To promote or engage in the following, but not limited to, acts that would create civil liability, criminal acts, criminal acts of violence, terrorism, hate crimes, the destruction of any state, or discrimination on the basis of race, national origin, religion, military and veteran status, disability, sex, age, or sexual orientation, or support of any entity that engages in these activities.
- G. To travel to NRPA's Annual Conference or any other conference travel.



#### 10. Audit

Grantee is expected to keep and maintain detailed books and records relating to the Grant, and the Grant Funds (including, without limitation, all uses thereof and expenditures therefrom) (collectively, the "Records") during the Term and for a period of seven (7) years thereafter (the "Audit Period"). NRPA and its assigns have the right to audit the Grantee's financial records relating to this MOU upon not less than ten (10) business days' advance written notice to Grantee by NRPA at any time during the Audit Period, at NRPA's sole expense, during Grantee's normal business hours. If as a result of an audit, NRPA determines that Grant Funds were not spent in accordance with the purposes of this Grant, the Grantee shall: (1) be required to return any Grant Funds not substantiated, and (2) reimburse NRPA for all costs and expenses incurred in connection with such audit. If NRPA determines that Grant Funds were used for fraudulent purposes, the Grantee shall be barred from participation in any further programs. Grantee shall further indemnify, defend, and hold the Support Parties harmless from any acts or omissions relating to its fraudulent use of the Grant Funds.

#### **11. Termination and Repayment**

Either party may terminate this MOU at any time for any reason upon providing the other party thirty (30) calendar days' written notice. Further, either party may terminate this MOU at any time effective upon receipt of written notice by the other party of failure to perform. In the event that this MOU is terminated for any reason, Grantee shall promptly repay to NRPA any portion of the Grant Funds not already spent (subject to and in accordance with all of the terms and conditions hereof) as of the effective date of such termination.

Neither party shall be liable to the other by reason of termination of this MOU for compensation, reimbursement or damages for any loss of prospective profits on anticipated sales or for expenditures, investments, leases or other commitments relating to the business or goodwill of any of the parties, notwithstanding any law to the contrary. No termination of this MOU shall release the obligation to pay any sums due to the terminating party which accrued prior to such termination.

#### 12. Force Majeure

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained herein, neither Party shall be liable for any delays or failures in performance of this MOU resulting from acts beyond its reasonable control, including, but not limited to hostilities, civil commotion, terrorist attacks, or riots; labor dispute, strike or lockout; public health emergency,

epidemic, pandemic, or coronavirus; accident, fire, flood, earthquake, hurricane, typhoon, tornado, windstorm, or explosion; lack of or failure of transportation facilities; lack of or failure of power or water facilities; regulation, ordinance, or requirement by any government or governmental agency having or claiming to have jurisdiction over the subject matter of this MOU or over the parties; government shutdown; any act of God or of Government; or any cause, existing or future, making a Party's obligations commercially impracticable, illegal, or impossible to perform under this MOU as the Parties originally contracted. In such case, the affected Party may terminate this MOU, without liability, upon written notification.

#### 13. Governing Law, Jurisdiction, Venue and Dispute Resolution

This MOU and the performance thereof shall be governed, interpreted, construed and regulated by the law of the Commonwealth of Virginia, without reference to or application of principles concerning conflicts of laws of any jurisdiction. Before commencing any litigation arising out of or relating to the relationship of the parties, this MOU, or the breach hereof, the parties agree to negotiate in good faith to resolve such dispute within fifteen (15) business days of notice by the other party of such dispute. Should the parties fail to mutually resolve their dispute and commence litigation, the parties hereby irrevocably consent to venue before the federal and state courts situated in the Commonwealth of Virginia and each party hereby irrevocably submits to the jurisdiction of such courts. The prevailing party in any action or litigation, including appeals, arising out of or related to this MOU



shall be awarded its reasonable attorney's fees and costs. Grantee agrees that NRPA would not have an adequate remedy at law and would be irreparably injured if Grantee breaches its covenants hereunder and NRPA shall be entitled to injunctive relief as a remedy for any breach or threatened breach hereof without showing or proving any actual damages.

#### 13. No Agency

Each party and its officers, employees, agents, contractors and/or consultants are independent contractors and are not, nor shall they hold themselves out to as or claim to be, employees or agents of the other party or any department, agency or unit thereof; accordingly, neither party shall have any authority to enter into any agreement on behalf of the other party or otherwise cause the other party to incur any obligations whatsoever other than as set forth herein.

#### 14. Notices

All notices, requests, demands and other communications required or permitted under this MOU must be in writing and will be deemed to have been duly given, made and received only (a) when personally delivered, or (b) on the date specified for delivery when deposited with an overnight courier service such as Federal Express for delivery to the intended addressee, or (c) when sent via facsimile, only so long as followed by a hard copy sent in a manner set forth in (a) or (b) above, or (d) when delivered via email, only so long as followed by a hard copy sent in a manner set forth in (a) or (b) above, each of the foregoing addressed as set forth below:

# ORDINANCE NO.

### AN ORDINANCE ADDING CHAPTER 9.41 TO TITLE 9 OF THE EL CAJON MUNICIPAL CODE TO PROHIBIT DEMONSTRATIONS THAT TARGET RESIDENCES

WHEREAS, the United States Constitution's protections under the First Amendment are foundational rights that protect our democracy; and

WHEREAS, in recent years, and in 2020 and 2021 in particular, communities around our nation have experienced heightened levels of demonstration, and some of those demonstrations have been targeted towards individuals and have occurred at the residences of those individuals; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believe it to be in the best interest of the residents of the City of El Cajon to adopt an ordinance to prohibit picketing or demonstrations from taking place in front of a particular residence.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL CAJON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Chapter 9.41 is hereby added to Title 9 of the El Cajon Municipal Code to read as follows:

# Chapter 9.41 PICKETING OF PRIVATE RESIDENCE

# 9.41.010 Intent and purpose.

It is the intent of the City Council in enacting this chapter to adopt a limited prohibition against targeted picketing which shall be construed and applied in accordance with the interpretation given to a similar ordinance by the United States Supreme Court in *Frisby v. Schultz*, 487 U.S. 474 (1988). Section 9.41.020 shall only prohibit picketing focused on and taking place in front of a particular residence. The limited purpose of the prohibition is to preclude intrusion upon the constitutionally protected privacy rights of the targeted resident.

# 9.41.020 Picketing private residence prohibited.

It is unlawful for any person to engage in picketing before or about the residence or dwelling of any individual in the City of El Cajon.

A. For purposes of this section, the term "residential dwelling" means any permanent building being used by its occupants solely for nontransient residential uses.

- B. For purposes of this section, the term "targeted picketing" means picketing activity that is targeted at a particular residential dwelling and proceeds in a location or on a definite course or route in front of or immediately adjacent to that particular residential dwelling.
- C. This section does not and shall not be interpreted to preclude picketing in a residential area that is not targeted at a particular residential dwelling.

Section 2. If any portion of this ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, is for any reason held to be invalid, unenforceable or unconstitutional, by a court of competent jurisdiction, that portion shall be deemed severable, and such invalidity, unenforceability or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of the ordinance, or its application to any other person or circumstance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted each section, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance, irrespective of the fact that any one or more other sections, sentences, clauses or phrases of the ordinance be declared invalid, unenforceable or unconstitutional.

Section 3. The City Council of the City of El Cajon intends this ordinance to supplement, not to duplicate or contradict, applicable state and federal law and this ordinance shall be construed in light of that intent.

Section 4. This ordinance shall go into effect thirty (30) days following its passage and adoption.

Section 5. The City Clerk shall certify to the passage and adoption of this ordinance and shall cause the same to be published or posted according to law.

### ORDINANCE NO. 5105

### AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND SECTION 17.190.040 OF, AND TO ADD SECTION 17.190.265 TO, CHAPTER 17.190 OF TITLE 17 OF THE EL CAJON MUNICIPAL CODE TO ALLOW SIGNS ON CITY-OWNED PROPERTY UNDER CERTAIN CRITERIA

WHEREAS, the City of El Cajon (the "City") finds it appropriate to amend subsection 17.190.040 of Chapter 17.190 of Title 17 of the El Cajon Municipal Code ("ECMC") to allow City Council to approve a sign (e.g. digital billboard) on City-owned property for general advertising for hire after consideration of factors, such as maximization of the economic value of the City-owned property, revenue generation to the City's general fund, dissemination of City's own messages, public service announcements, and other messages to the public, and encouragement of economic activity; and

WHEREAS, amending ECMC section 17.190.040 will also allow the City Manager to permit non-commercial speech signs to be placed in the right-of-way for no more than fifteen (15) days subject to a policy established by the City Council.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL CAJON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Subsections F and I of section 17.190.040 of the El Cajon Municipal Code are hereby repealed.

SECTION 2. A new subsection F is added to section 17.190.040 of Chapter 17.190 of Title 17 of the El Cajon Municipal Code to read as follows:

F. Billboard Policy. It is a fundamental land use policy of the city of El Cajon to prohibit the construction, erection or use of any billboards, as defined in this chapter, other than those that legally exist in the city, or for which a valid permit has been issued and has not expired as of the date on which this provision is first adopted, or as may be allowed by the S overlay zone (section 17.190.270, below). The city adopts this policy pursuant to California Government Code section 65850, and California Business and Professions Code sections 5354(a) and 5408.3 (both effective January 1, 2003). No permit shall be issued for any billboard that violates this policy, and the construction or maintenance of any billboard in violation of this subsection is declared a nuisance and the city may take immediate steps to abate any nuisance created by any billboard constructed or maintained in violation of this policy. The city council affirmatively declares that it would have adopted this subsection even if it were the only provision in this chapter.

SECTION 3. A new subsection I is added to section 17.190.040 of Chapter 17.190, of Title 17 of the El Cajon Municipal Code to read as follows:

I. On or Projected Over Public Right-of-Way; On City-owned Property. No sign may be placed on, or project over the public right-of-way, and no sign shall be allowed on City-owned property, unless such projection or placement is specifically authorized by this chapter or by a policy statement or resolution, adopted by the city council, authorizing such projection or placement.

SECTION 4. Section 17.190.265 is hereby added to Chapter 17.190 of Title 17 of the El Cajon Municipal Code to read as follows:

# 17.190.265 Signs permitted on city-owned property or rights-of-way.

- A. Prohibition. Private persons and governmental agencies other than the city may not display signs on city property (except as provided in subsection B, below) and rights-of-way (except as provided in subsection C, below) unless such display is specifically authorized by this chapter or by state or federal law, or court order.
- B. Signs on City-owned Property. In order to realize the revenue potential of property owned by the city, and to provide a method for city messages to be presented to the public, the city council may allow approved private parties to place signs on city property in consideration of such fee and other consideration to be negotiated and included in a lease, license agreement, development agreement, or other legal arrangement.
  - 1. Types of Signage. Signs placed by private parties may be of whatever nature approved by the city council in accordance with subsection D below. Signs might include permanent signs, such as billboards with static display, and may include electronic message display. Signs might also include leasing or a license of time and space on a city-owned permanent sign such as a billboard, whether static display or electronic message display. Approved signs might also be freeway-oriented signs.
  - 2. Duration of Signage. Signs will only be allowed to remain on the city-owned property for the period of time approved by the city in the agreement between the city and the private party.
  - 3. Types of Speech Allowed. The approved signs may include commercial and non-commercial speech *provided* that non-commercial speech shall not include: political speech (e.g., campaign advertisements, messages intended to promote legislation, etc.); commercial speech advertising tobacco or tobacco-related products (as defined in this Code), alcohol, cannabis and cannabis-related products, adult entertainment,

gambling, or other adult-oriented products or commercial activities; or the direct promotion of sectarian beliefs. In addition, the message substitution policy in section 17.190.040(D) shall not apply for the purpose of substituting any prohibited speech for any other commercial or non-commercial speech, it being understood that such speech has other media and avenues of communication available for such speech.

- C. Signs in City Right-of-way. Signs in the city's rights-of-way shall be prohibited unless approved by the city manager, pursuant to such policy as may be established by the City Council from time-to-time.
  - 1. Limited Duration. Private party signs in the city's rights-of-way shall be limited to not more than fifteen (15) days. Signs must be removed at the end of the period approved or are subject to removal by city forces, to be held for a period of 30 days or until claimed by the person owning the sign, whichever first occurs.
  - 2. Commercial Speech Prohibited. The approved signs shall not include commercial speech, and the message substitution policy in section 17.190.040(D) shall not apply to allow for any commercial speech.
  - 3. Size Limitations. Signs in the city's rights-of-way shall not be allowed where it would create traffic hazards. Signs shall not exceed a total of 18 square feet in size, and shall not exceed three (3) feet in height.
- D. Procedures for Approval of Use of City-owned Property for Signs. The city manager shall establish procedures for selecting persons desiring to use city-owned property in excess of 30 consecutive days. The city manager shall identify the location of property where signs meeting the requirements of this chapter can be placed, and a request for proposals shall be advertised and circulated to interested parties. The proposals shall be evaluated and a recommendation made to the city council. Criteria to be considered shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
  - 1. The extent to which the proposal maximizes the economic value of the city's property;
  - 2. The extent to which the proposal will contribute revenue to the city's general fund;

- 3. The extent to which the proposal will allow dissemination of the city's own messages, public service announcements, and other messages to the public; and
- 4. The extent to which the proposal will encourage economic activity in the city.
- E. Location and Limitations. All new signs constructed and located on city-owned property, or city rights-of-way pursuant to this chapter must meet the following requirements:
  - 1. They shall comply with all applicable requirements of this Code, and of any other regulatory authority including, if applicable, rules of the California State Department of Transportation for freeway-oriented signs;
  - 2. They shall be allowed in locations providing the greatest exposure to high traffic areas in the city;
  - 3. They shall comply with all height and size criteria as determined by the city council; and
  - 4. They shall be exempt from the provisions of section 17.190.270.

SECTION 5. This ordinance shall go into effect thirty (30) days following its passage and adoption.

### ORDINANCE NO. 5106

### AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CHAPTER 2.75 OF TITLE 2 OF THE EL CAJON MUNICIPAL CODE RELATING TO ELECTRONIC AND PAPERLESS FILING OF FAIR POLITICAL PRACTICES COMMISSION CAMPAIGN DISCLOSURE STATEMENTS

WHEREAS, public access to campaign and Statement of Economic Interest disclosure information is an integral component of a fully informed electorate, and transparency is critical in order to maintain public trust and support of the political process; and

WHEREAS, since the enactment of the Political Reform Act, candidates and committees have complied with filing requirements by filing paper copies of campaign statements and reports; and

WHEREAS, the City Clerk is the Local Filing Officer for the Fair Political Practices Commission disclosure statements and is responsible for receiving, reviewing, and making available campaign disclosure statements; and

WHEREAS, implementation of electronic filing of Fair Political Practices Commission campaign disclosure statements will help the City of El Cajon (the "City") reach its goal of operational excellence by allowing campaign disclosure statements to be filed electronically, and strengthens the City's initiative of fostering public trust through an open and ethical government by making those statements immediately available to the public; and

WHEREAS, the elimination of manual processing of filings through electronic filing requirements will conserve resources and ensure the public has access to the information disclosed in campaign statements; and

WHEREAS, the City Clerk has identified a web-based system that will allow electronic filing, in compliance with California Government Code section 84615 and has been approved by the Secretary of State for the electronic filing of campaign disclosure statements; and

WHEREAS, California Government Code section 84615 provides that a legislative body of a local government agency may adopt an ordinance that requires an elected officer, candidate, committee, or other person required to file statements, reports, or other documents required by Chapter 4 of the Political Reform Act to file such statements, reports or other documents online or electronically with the City Clerk; and

WHEREAS, the City Council expressly finds and determines that the City Clerk's web-based system has been approved by the Secretary of State for the electronic filing of campaign disclosure statements, and that the software contains multiple safeguards to protect the integrity and security of the data, will operate securely and effectively, and will not unduly burden Filers; and

WHEREAS, the City Clerk will operate the electronic filing system in compliance with the requirements of California Government Code section 84615, as may be amended from time to time, and any other applicable laws.

NOW THEREFORE, THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF EL CAJON DOES ORDAIN AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The title of Chapter 2.75 of the El Cajon Municipal Code is hereby changed to read, "Conflict of Interest Code; Campaign Disclosure Statements."

Section 2. A new section 2.75.015 is hereby added to Chapter 2.75 of the El Cajon Municipal Code to read as follows:

# 2.75.015 Electronic Filing of Campaign Disclosure Statements.

- A. General.
  - Any elected officer, candidate, committee, or other person required to file statements, reports or other documents ("Statements") as required by Chapter 4 of the Political Reform Act (California Government Code section 84100, *et seq.*) ("Filers") may, and beginning February 1, 2022, shall, file such Statements using the City Clerk's online system according to procedures established by the City Clerk (the "Procedures").
  - 2. The City Clerk shall have the authority to establish and amend the Procedures, as necessary, to:
    - a. ensure that the online system complies with the requirements set forth in section 84615 of the Government Code, as may be amended from time to time;
    - b. meet the purpose and intent of this ordinance and comply with other applicable law; and
    - c. ensure the integrity of the data transmitted and include safeguards against efforts to tamper with, manipulate, alter, or subvert the data.
  - 3. Online filings made under this chapter will only be accepted if made in the standardized record format that is developed by the California Secretary of State pursuant to section 84602(a)(2) of the California Government Code, as may be amended from time to time, and that is compatible with the Secretary of State's system for receiving an online or electronic filing.

- B. Procedures for Utilizing Online Filing.
  - 1. During the period commencing with the effective date of this ordinance and ending January 31, 2022, Filers may choose to opt-in to the electronic filing system by electronically filing a Statement that is required to be filed with the City Clerk pursuant to Chapter 4 of the Political Reform Act. Once a Filer has opted-in, all subsequent Statements by that Filer shall be filed electronically. Until February 1, 2022, a Filer may opt-out of the electronic filing system by filing an original Statement in paper format with the City Clerk. Once a Filer has opted-out, and before February 1, 2022, the Filer shall file all original Statements in paper format with the City Clerk. From and after January 31, 2022, electronic filing is mandatory for all Filers, unless the Filer is exempt under California Government Code section 84615, as may be amended from time to time. A Filer so exempt may continue to opt-in or opt-out as described in this section.
  - 2. Any Filer who has electronically filed a statement using the City Clerk's online system is not required to also file a copy of that document in paper format with the City Clerk.

Section 3. If any portion of this ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, is for any reason held to be invalid, unenforceable or unconstitutional, by a court of competent jurisdiction, that portion shall be deemed severable, and such invalidity, unenforceability or unconstitutionality shall not affect the validity or enforceability of the remaining portions of the ordinance, or its application to any other person or circumstance. The City Council hereby declares that it would have adopted each section, sentence, clause or phrase of this ordinance, irrespective of the fact that any one or more other sections, sentences, clauses or phrases of the ordinance be declared invalid, unenforceable or unconstitutional.
