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


# **District Election Map**

During the November 2016 general election, El Cajon residents overwhelmingly voted to approve Measure S. The measure changed El Cajon's City Charter and transitions the City's election process for Councilmembers from a citywide at-large election to a by-district election process beginning in 2018. While the Mayor will continue to be elected at-large, City Councilmembers will be elected by the residents from each of the four new districts, beginning with District 1 in 2018 and District 2-4 in 2020.

The new district map was one of several developed and considered during a series of public workshops. The City Council selected and approved the district map on Tuesday May 23.

**Wells Park Improvements** 

Great things are happening at the City's 17-acre Wells Park! Recently, the City and community members came together to build a new playground funded through KaBOOM! grant funds. A dog agility course was also built next to the Wells' dog park. But these improvements just scratch the surface of what's to come!

Over the next few years, Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funds obtained by the City will be used to significantly renovate and improve Wells Park. During the first phase of improvements, several parking spaces will be converted to short-term parking and decorative fencing will be installed around the park's two Boys & Girls Club facilities.

In addition, a temporary Staff and Recreation Office will be placed in the heart of the park, with plans for a permanent building in the works.



Supervision at the park will also be increased to include two full-time and one part-time City employee. This additional staffing will enhance safety and recreation activities in the park. Additional safety and design improvements to the restrooms and parking lot will be made during the second phase of renovations. The restrooms will be modernized while lighting in the parking lot will be improved along with new landscaping, fencing and a park monument sign.



Phase three of the park improvements is in the conceptual stage and expected to take several years but includes some very exciting possibilities. Projects being discussed and considered include a new "splash pad" playground or an indoor soccer park.

# Completion of New City Animal Shelter Expected Next Summer

Construction of the City's new state-of-the-art animal shelter in El Cajon is in full-swing! In May, the City Council broke ground on a vacant lot next to the City's current 50 year-old facility on North Marshall Avenue. The \$9.3 million facility will double the shelter's current size to nearly 11,000 square-feet with an additional 2,600 square feet of outdoor space.

The shelter will include more space for animals, a veterinary clinic, animal play, exercise and interactive spaces and plenty of space for pet adoptions. The design allows for future expansion if it is ever needed. Funding for the shelter was made possible by a voter approved sales tax that ended in early 2015. Construction of the shelter is expected to be finished next summer.

# **Exciting New Look for the Ronald Reagan Community Center**

# **Courtyard by Marriott Hotel Nears Completion**

El Cajon's first major hotel development in decades will open its doors for business this fall. The 120-room **Courtyard by Marriott Hotel** features a swimming pool, outdoor dining, a business center and meeting rooms. The development also includes two new commercial storefronts along Magnolia Avenue. The hotel itself is located at the corner of Magnolia and Rea Avenue, just north of Main Street in the heart of downtown El Cajon.

The development of East County's first true four-star hotel marks an economic turning point for the City of El Cajon. The new Courtyard by Marriott will not only be visually iconic within our City, but is expected to draw additional business investment to the area.



# Hampton Inn by Hilton Coming to El Cajon

El Cajon will soon be home to *Hampton Inn by Hilton*! In July, the City Council approved Brixton Capital Group and Excel Hotel Group's plans to redevelop the City's former police station site to build the new hotel and Fletcher Marketplace, consisting of three commercial buildings, including an In-N-Out Burger.

The Hampton Inn by Hilton will be located on Fletcher Parkway across from Parkway Plaza. The hotel will be the City's second major hotel development once the downtown Courtyard by Marriott Hotel is complete this fall. For more information on this project, please call (619) 441-1742.



## **New Honda of El Cajon**

# **New Mercedes-Benz Dealership**

Construction of a new Mercedes-Benz dealership in El Cajon is nearly complete! A grand opening and ribbon cutting ceremony is expected to be announced by years end. This 70,000 square foot facility, on just under five acres, will have state of the art service facilities, and offer new and pre-owned Mercedes-Benz vehicles. The new dealership is located on the southwest corner of Marshall Avenue and Wagner Drive.

# Plans Approved for New Jaguar & Land Rover Dealership

Jaguar and Land Rover have joined the list of high-end car brands slated to build a new dealership in El Cajon's Valley of Cars! An application was approved by the City Council on March 14, 2017, for the new dealership at the northwest corner of Marshall Avenue and Wagner Drive – across the street from the new Mercedes-Benz dealership currently under construction. Construction is expected to begin in 2018.



## **Transit District Plan**

Development of a new "Transit District Plan" for the City of El Cajon is under way! The plan provides a new vision for the area around the El Cajon Transit Center located on South Marshall Avenue. The plan will update the City's land use and zoning, design new streetscapes and guide future development of the immediate area around the transit center. The plan is funded by a SANDAG Smart Growth Incentive Grant in partnership with the City of El Cajon and will be completed in the fall of this year. # **Salvation Army Community Center**

# Cornerstone Place -Beautiful New Apartment Homes and Offices

The City will soon have more affordable housing choices! Cornerstone Place is a four-story development at 230 South Sunshine Avenue that will provide both living and office space. This exciting project will include 70 affordable multi-family one and three bedroom units, outdoor spaces, a community room and numerous resident amenities.

Construction of Cornerstone is likely to begin in September and is expected to be completed in January of 2019. It will provide high-quality housing for veterans and families. The developer plans to achieve a silver rating of Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED). This rating confirms the project is of the highest environmental standards and meets strict energy-conservation standards with lower energy and water bills; reduced greenhouse gas emissions; and less exposure to mold, mildew and other indoor toxins. # Johnson Avenue Sewer Project Update

The City's sewer improvements along Johnson Avenue reached a critical milestone following the completion of a 310-foot section of tunnel that crossed under Fletcher Parkway. The 66-inch steel tunnel allows the City to install a sewer relief pipeline across Fletcher Parkway through the 30-foot deep tunnel without any traffic interruption. Once the pipeline is installed, City crews will begin a second tunnel on the west side of the Parkway Village Mall that will cross underneath Interstate 8. These improvements will improve the sewer system's reliability and reduce the City's cost to maintain the system.

# Mall Enforcement for Your Shopping Pleasure

Another valuable service provided by the El Cajon Police Department is its Mall Enforcement Team (MET) created in 2012 through a unique partnership with Parkway Plaza mall.

To enhance the safe, family-oriented environment at Parkway Plaza, the El Cajon Police Department maintains two officers that are assigned to the mall on a full-time basis. This two-officer team responds to any complaints on mall property and works together with mall security officers to maintain safety and security for shoppers. Since the introduction of MET, crime in and around the Parkway Plaza shopping mall has been significantly reduced. Parkway Plaza and the El Cajon Police Department are committed to providing a safe environment at this busy mall.

# **Keeping Our Channels Clean**

The City of El Cajon puts considerable effort in keeping our streets and storm drains clean. Yet, in spite of these efforts, trash and debris continues to collect in our drainage channels and storm drains in large amounts, polluting the water and creating an unsightly mess.

An analysis of the trash removed from City streets, storm drains and drainage channels reveals that a majority of the trash originates from sales at fast food restaurants and convenience stores. More than half of the trash removed consists of disposable beverage cups and food wrappers.

The following articles include information for both business owners and customers to ensure that trash finds its way into trash trucks and receptacles instead of our streets, storm drains, drainage channels and ultimately the beaches.



### The Importance of Street Sweeping



Each year, the City of El Cajon conducts twice-yearly cleanups of all City storm drain inlets and drainage channels to remove trash, sediment and debris. In addition, the City has developed a comprehensive street sweeping program with regular sweeping cycles for industrial, commercial and residential areas as weather permits. During times when street sweeping is not possible, City staff conduct "Storm Water Patrols" to identify areas where more limited, localized cleanups can be accomplished. As a result, City crews collect several thousand cubic yards of trash, sediment and debris each year in the effort to keep our City streets and storm water systems clean.

## **Protecting Our Waterways**

## **Keeping Storm Drains Clean**

It's important to understand the difference between sanitary sewers and storm drains to prevent environmental damage. The sanitary sewer is a system of underground pipes that carries sewage from bathrooms, sinks, kitchens, and other plumbing components to a wastewater treatment plant, where it is filtered, treated and discharged.

The storm drain is a system designed to carry rainfall runoff and other outside, non-plumbed drainage. It is not designed to carry sewage or accept hazardous wastes. The runoff is carried in underground pipes or open ditches and discharges without treatment of any kind into local streams, rivers and other environmentally-sensitive, surface waters. Storm drain inlets are typically found along the curbed edges of street and other low-lying outdoor areas. Some older buildings have basement floor drains that connect to the storm drain system.

Disposal of chemicals or hazardous substances to the storm drain system damages the environment. Motor oil, cleaners, paints and other common household items that get into storm drains can poison fish, birds, and other wildlife, and can find their way into drinking water supplies. In addition, grass clippings, leaves, litter, and organic matter can clog storm drains and cause flooding.


# Here are simple ways to help maintain our sewer systems and keep storm drains and the environment clean:

- Do not pour anything into storm drains
- Keep storm drains clear of leaves, grass clippings, sticks and litter
- Repair any leaks and drips from your vehicle
- Collect and recycle motor oil
- Clean up spills using absorbents or dry sweeping and don't wash them into a drain
- Don't pour paints, solvents, cleaners, or anything that might be toxic into any drain – take it to your local household hazardous waste collection facility
- Minimize the use of herbicides, pesticides and fertilizers

Having a clean environment is of primary importance for our health and economy. Clean waterways provide recreation, commercial opportunities, fish habitat, and add beauty to our landscape. All of us benefit from clean water - and all of us have a role in getting and keeping our lakes, rivers, wetlands, beaches and groundwater clean.

Together we can help keep our streets and drainage channels clean.
