BACKGROUND:

Overview:

This agenda report provides an overview of the redistricting process, redistricting criteria, and U.S. Census data for El Cajon. This report also opens the third of at least four public hearings to gather public input about El Cajon's City Council district election boundaries.

Redistricting Background:

Redistricting is the process of adjusting City Council voting districts so that each district has substantially the same number of residents. Cities with voting districts are required to update their district election map following the release of the U.S. Census data. Cities that experience little change in district populations can choose to identify the existing district boundaries as the map selected for consideration at the conclusion of the required public hearings.

El Cajon transitioned from an at-large election process for City Councilmembers with the passage of Measure S in November 2016. The Mayor remains elected at-large.

Following the passage of Measure S, the City retained National Demographic Corporation (NDC) to develop voting district maps and facilitate public hearings. In June 2017, the City Council approved the current district election map (Attachment 1). The current map was developed using the 2010 U.S. Census data with 2017 demographic estimates (Attachment 2).

Redistricting Process:

The transition to City Council districts means that the City must evaluate its voting districts based on the 2020 state-adjusted Census data. On September 27, 2021, the State of California posted the 2020 U.S. Census data. For California cities, these figures are the final numbers

needed to determine if district boundaries need to be adjusted.

NDC processed these numbers for the current El Cajon election districts (Attachment 3). NDC found that the City's current population deviation – the difference between the most populous and least populous districts – is 5.35%. This value is within the 10% threshold where a map is considered "presumptively constitutional," and thus the districts do not need to be redrawn to comply with the federal equal population requirement, although different boundaries may be considered. The final election district map must be approved by April 17, 2022, to comply with election laws.

In October 2019, the California Legislature passed AB 849, the Fair and Inclusive Redistricting for Municipal and Political Subdivisions (FAIR MAPS) Act, which requires cities to ensure maps comply with set redistricting criteria. The Act further outlines the specified steps a jurisdiction must take to encourage public participation of its residents and the deadlines for the adoption of new boundaries by a governing body. If after receiving public testimony through outreach and the required public hearings, and considering any alternative district boundaries, the City Council elects to maintain the current election districts without further adjustment then the election district lines may be retained.

Redistricting Criteria:

Under the FAIR MAPS Act, the City Council shall draw and adopt election districting boundaries using the following criteria in the listed order of priority:

1. Comply with the federal requirements of equal population and the Voting Rights Act;
2. Geographically contiguous;
3. Undivided neighborhoods and "communities of interest";
4. Easily identifiable boundaries;
5. Compact; and
6. Shall not favor or discriminate against a political party.

Once the prioritized criteria are met, other traditional districting principles can be considered such as:

1. Minimize the number of voters delayed from voting in 2022 to 2024;
2. Respect voters' choices / continuity of office; and
3. Future population growth.

In February 2017, the City Council passed Resolution 006-17. In addition to affirming the state and federal redistricting criteria, the Resolution established the following criteria:

1. To the extent it does not conflict with federal or state law, an effort should be made to establish boundaries so that at least two council districts include voters in similar numbers residing in the City's central business district (also known as downtown El Cajon as described by the boundaries of Specific Plan 182); and
2. These council districts should also include comparable geographic area and land uses.

Redistricting Hearings:

To gather community input in the redistricting process, and as required by the FAIR MAPS Act, four public hearings were scheduled. These hearings were located in different City Council Districts to ensure the City receives a wide variety of community input. The hearings are scheduled on:

- Wednesday, July 14, 2021, 6:30 p.m. at Hillside Recreation Center;
- Wednesday, September 8, 2021, 6:30 p.m. at Renette Recreation Center;
- Thursday, November 4, 2021, 7:00 p.m. at Kennedy Recreation Center; and
- Saturday, January 22, 2022, 10:30 a.m. at El Cajon Valley High School.

During the first hearing, staff provided an overview of the redistricting process and gathered input about communities of interest. During the second hearing, staff introduced online and paper mapping tools. Several participants of the second hearing also identified the middle-eastern community of interest generally within the following geographic boundaries:

- Broadway to the north;
- Jamacha Road and 2nd Street to the east;
- Washington Avenue to the south; and
- Magnolia Avenue to the west.

During tonight's public hearing City staff will provide an overview of the redistricting process, redistricting criteria, and provide a summary of El Cajon's U.S. Census data. In addition, the City Council will have the opportunity to confirm that the City's current election district map still conforms to the mapping criteria.

The fourth public hearing is scheduled on Saturday, January 22, 2022, at 10:30 a.m., at El Cajon Valley High School. It is anticipated that during this hearing, the City Council will select and potentially approve its final District Election Map for adoption at a later date, but not later than April 17, 2022.

Draft Map

Based on the 2020 U.S. Census data, the current El Cajon City Council district election map remains balanced. Furthermore, the map meets the FAIR MAPS Act, Federal Voting Rights Act, and City of El Cajon mapping criteria. During its October 26, 2021, the City Council found that the existing district map met the legal criteria to remain in place. The City Council also suspended additional demographer services from NCD and allowed for additional maps to be submitted to be considered at future public hearings.

The City will continue to accept draft maps from the public for consideration through Friday, January 14, 2022, at 12 p.m. Staff will evaluate each map against the criteria and principles outlined in this report. The City Council will be presented with all draft maps during its November 4, and January 22, hearings for consideration.

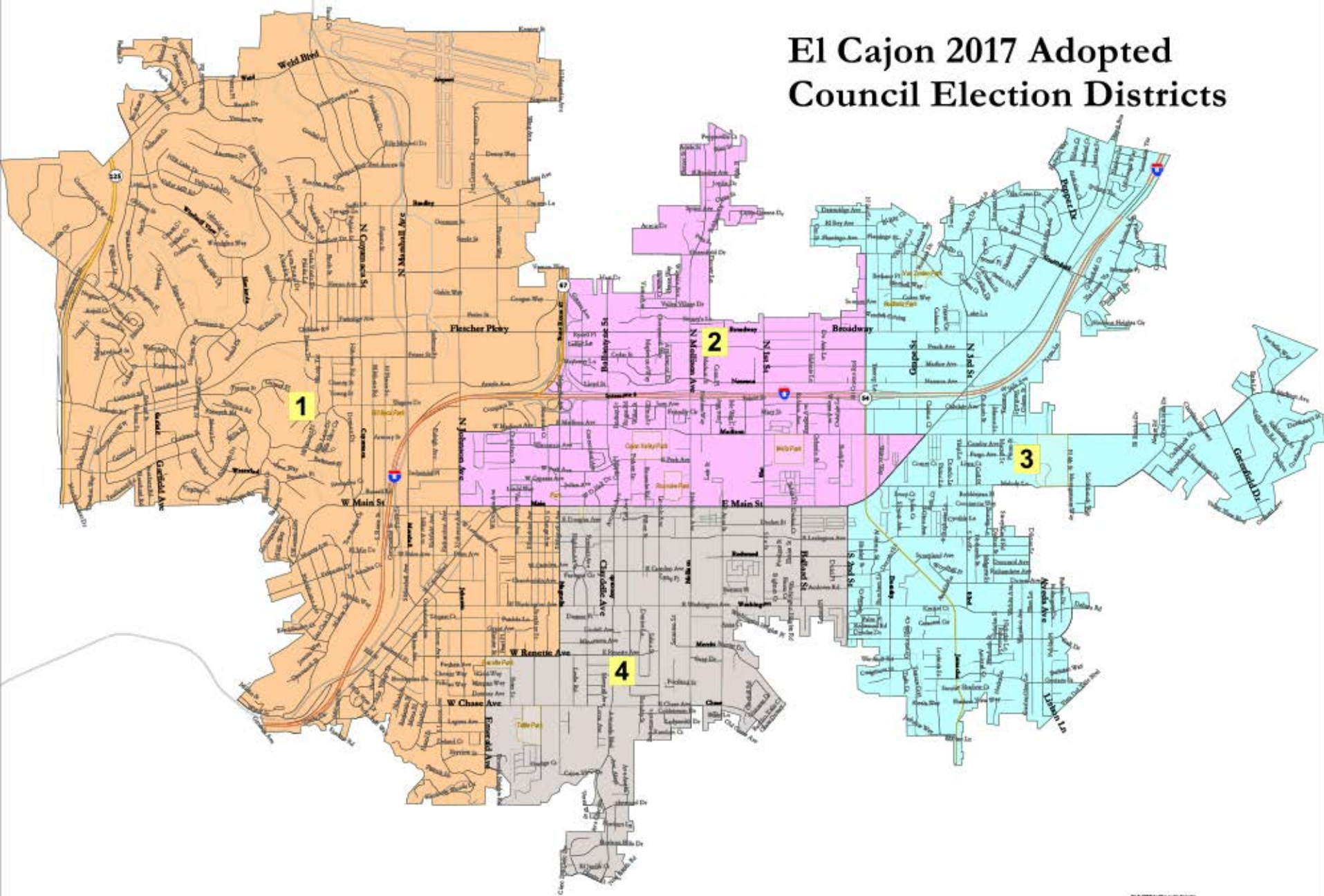
